

TOUR NOTES

AVON ASCENT September 10th

My initiation into mountain bike riding started with a phone call from Betty Stockman announcing that she would be giving up her seat on the bus, as she had recently taken in a new member to the family, a big boisterous black dog.

So armed with a bike kindly loaned to me by Ben Stockman, John Meakin and I arrived at Bob Stockman's garage bright and early so that we would not be left behind.

It was interesting to see the 14 other riders cleaning and preparing their steeds, ranging from the \$200 cheapy to the \$1,800 Mongoose which Michael Waters assured me would switch onto auto pilot when he got tired.

On the Great Northern Highway riding towards Brigadoon where the real mountain bike tracks start, it was fun to hear the other riders calling out hole, grid, rock, etc. and instead of the usual avoiding the obstacle game, they were used to test your skills for the forthcoming conditions.

Even though a key was available many chose to lift their bikes over the many gates we encountered. maybe it's part of being a good mountain bike rider. Aileen Martin queried why she should not be lifted over, since her bike had the privilege, so before she could change her mind she was promptly lifted over the gate.

We soon came to our first downhill run, and away went Bob and Ben on their new bikes, closely followed by the more experienced riders, who were closely followed by those out of control. The first timers, including myself, who has been more on the road than on the bike lately, took it very steady.

It wasn't long before one could understand the ravings of Bob Stockman the mountain bike junkie. The colour, tranquillity, beauty and utter enjoyment of riding the mountain tracks had got to me, to the point where a loud 'coo-ee' was in order.

It was interesting to see how Noel Eddington tackled the rough conditions at break-neck speed on his \$200 hybrid, which looks like a cross between a mountain and touring bike.

After about 25 kms had been covered the leader announced that a hill climb was available for those who were either fit or mad enough to attempt it. I opted for a snack at the bottom of the hill with about eight others.

A lunch stop was agreed upon at a beautiful section of the Avon River where about five of the riders decided to remove shoes and socks and cool off their tired feet in the river.

I thought with the warm sunny day we wer experiencing that one would see the occasional snake, but I then realised that any creature seeing a mongoose' with Michael's bulk on top would soon turn tail and flee.

The sight of John Martin with the bus and trailer was a welcome sight with Christina Porteous making a beaut cup of tea.

The cake which I baked as the result of a bake off with Betty Stockman was handed around and quickly consumed.

After everyone had rested, it was loading the bikes and into the bus for the trip back to Midland, where the bikes were cleaned and checked.

The only casualty was a flat tyre on Arie Lemson's touring bike while chasing Ben Stockman ove some rough sections.

HIGHLIGHTS OF RIDES YOU WILL WISH YOU HAD GONE ON

August 6th saw Kleber Claux at the head of eight riders riding from Armadale for the Jarrah country loop on a fine and cool morning. They used the back roads to North Dandalup then on to Dwellingup for refreshments and to enjoy the majesty of the Jarrah trees. The day's ride was a satisfying 150 km.

Friday evening, August 11th, saw a big number of CTA members at the Hossack pavilion to hear Rod Evans talk about his round Australia record ride. We much enjoyed Rod's easy and witty style but were left in no doubt of the suffering he had endured. After the question and answer session Rod was presented with a Jarrah burl clock by the CTA. The evening finished with a light supper and the opportunity to catch up with many friends in a pleasant social atmosphere.

The Soup Ride was marred by cool and damp conditions. Arie Lemson took five riders on a 15 km loop from Kings Park while Kleber Claux led eight more cyclists on an 85 km ride through Fremantle, Rockingham, Naval Base and Jandakot. The two groups met at the finish for hot soup and fresh bread rolls which were much appreciated in the cold weather.

September 3rd found Max Talbot at Kelmscott organising the 'classic' CTA ride - the 10,000 feet in 8 hours. This year he sent 21 riders on their way of which 17 earned their badges. The weather was unusually warm (24°) this year which made the climbing harder. Particular congratulations go to the tandem pair of Keith Hayes and Noel Eddington.

September 10th was the day of the Avon Ascent, which ranks as one of the most delightful rides I have been on. Phil Torkildsen led 15 of us up the Great Northern Highway to join the Westrail service road at Brigadoon. We then followed the service road's many undulations through wonderfully unspoiled country surrounded by wild flowers. The numerous gates on the track were opened by Neil Porteous who was kind enough to arrange with Westrail that we borrow the key for the day, the key's security being guaranteed by eighteen granny knots to Neil's braces! The ride

finished at the 72 km mark where John Martin met us with the bus and trailer, the billy being on the boil for lunch before the return to Midland.

The Audax/CTA weekend at the Old York Hospital was another lovely weekend, featured elsewhere in this newsletter. Perhaps next year we might try meeting at the hospital on Friday evening to give us two full days of touring this delightful area.

Mundaring Weir was the destination of nine riders who left Midland behind Kleber Claux on October 8th. They followed the route (read hilly!) through Darlington, the John Forrest National Park, Stoneville, Mount Helena, Sawyers Valley, Mundaring then on to the Weir for a barbecue in the upper garden. Kleber comments on the delights of the scent from the citrus orchards and the profusion of wild flowers, also the appetite a ride in the hills gives you!

October 14/15 was the Opperman All Day Trial. Five teams took part and congratulations go to the ATTA No. 1 team who set a new Australian Opperman record of 636 km, but when you learn the team included Rod Evans it comes as less of a surprise. Commiserations to Peter Meyer who was obliged to retire just seventy km from the finish with eye trouble. Also congratulations to Steve Parry and Robin Layton for successfully completing the event on their Moultons.

Bob Stockman led seven mountain bikers into the Kalamunda National Park on October 22nd. The scents and sights from the high points of the ride were breathtaking, as was the steepness of some of the climbs! We marvelled at the grace of a wedgetailed eagle soaring above us. We welcomed Vince Stone along for his first mountain ride with us.

I NEVER FELT BETTER IN MY LIFE

The following is an account of the legal proceedings of a cyclist's damages action for injuries sustained when he was hit by a farmer's truck carrying a horse and a dog. After swerving and hitting the cyclist the truck left the road and rolled over.

DEFENCE COUNSEL: After the accident didn't someone come over to you and ask you how you felt?

CYCLIST: Yes, I believe that is so.


DEFENCE COUNSEL: And didn't you tell him that you never felt better in your life?

CYCLIST: Yes, I guess I did.

Defence counsel then sat down with a satisfied look; but in re-examination the plaintiff's counsel asked only one question.

PLAINTIFF'S COUNSEL: Will you tell his Honour the circumstances in which you made that response?

CYCLIST: Yes. Not long after the accident, the horse, which had sustained broken legs, was thrashing around. A policeman from the Mounted Police Squad came up to the horse, put his revolver to its ear and shot it dead. He then went back over to the dog, which had a broken back and was howling miserably. He put his revolver to the dog's ear and shot it. Then he came over to me and asked, "How do you feel?" I said, "I never felt better in my life".



Bikewest was established in 1987 as a Government initiative to provide for safer and more convenient cycling in Western Australia.

Projects undertaken by Bikewest have included: the establishment of a bicycle helmet rebate and advertising scheme in schools (helmet wearing in primary schools has been doubled); the significant expansion of safe cycling routes in Perth (between June 1987 and June 1989 over 37 kilometres of new bike paths were constructed); the preparation of regional centre bike plans; the production of safety and information brochures and Perth Bike Maps; and the introduction of bicycle education into schools.
